18 ST. LUKE'S DAY

Patron saint of artists.

2I APPLE TUESDAY

Ralph Waldo Emerson called the apple our national fruit and this holiday honoring it began in 1904 as National Apple Day. It falls each year on the third Tuesday of October.

31 HALLOWE'EN
